Prices overall

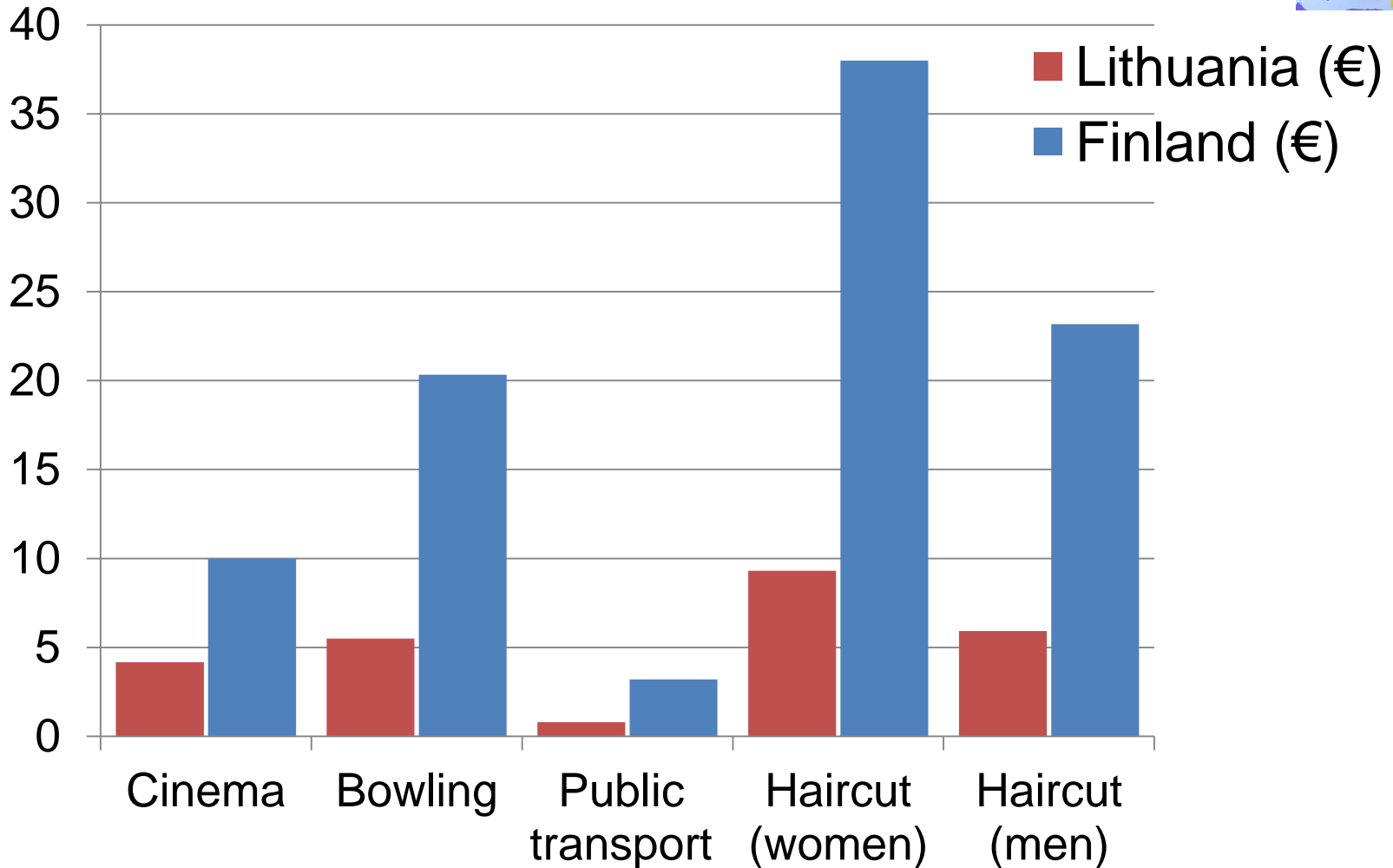

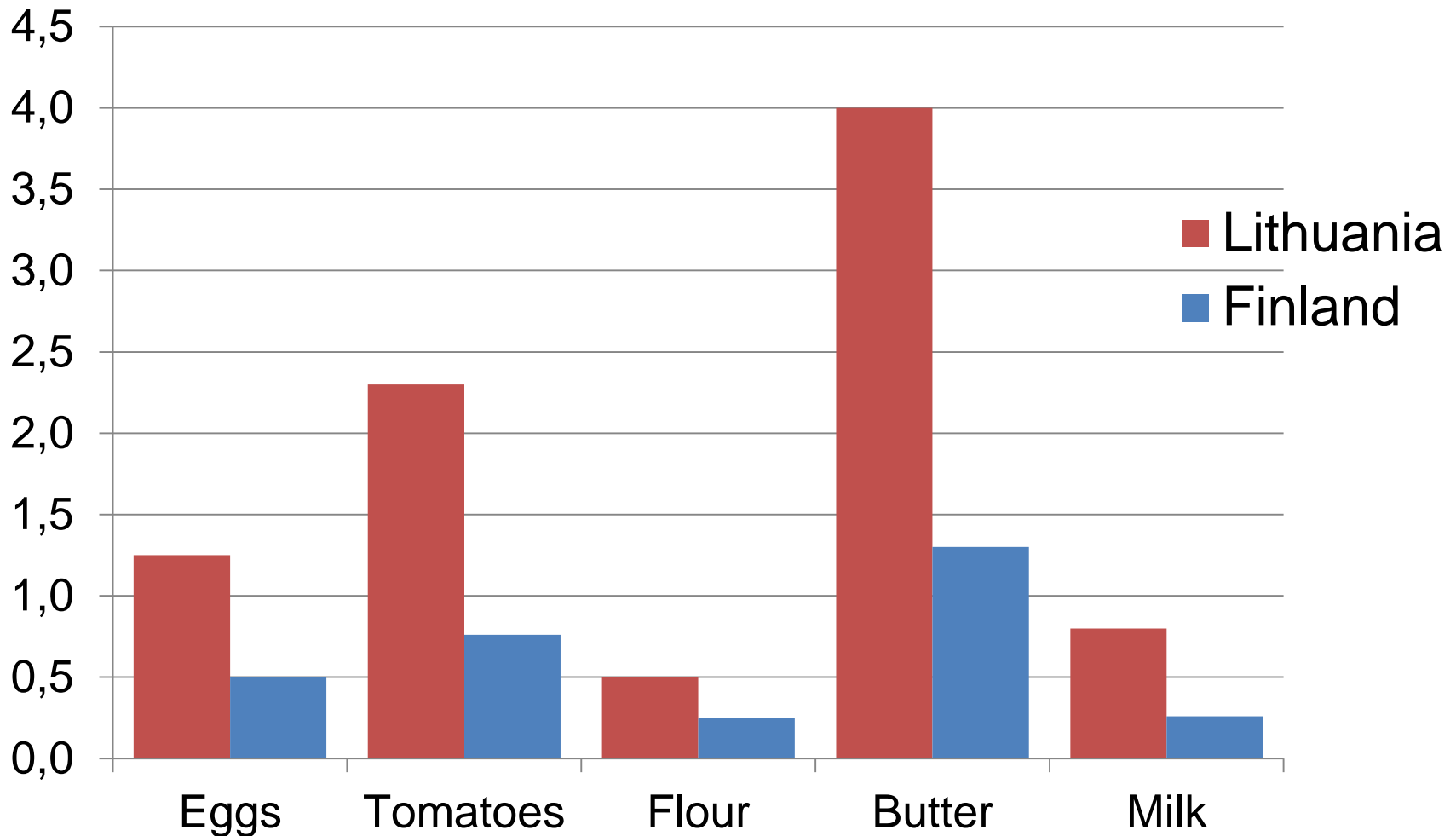
Relative prices



- When GDP/cap and salary levels are taken into account, relative price levels are actually lower in Finland, i.e. the purchasing power is greater;
- GDP - How much a country produces in a year;
- GDP/capita - GDP divided by number of inhabitants.

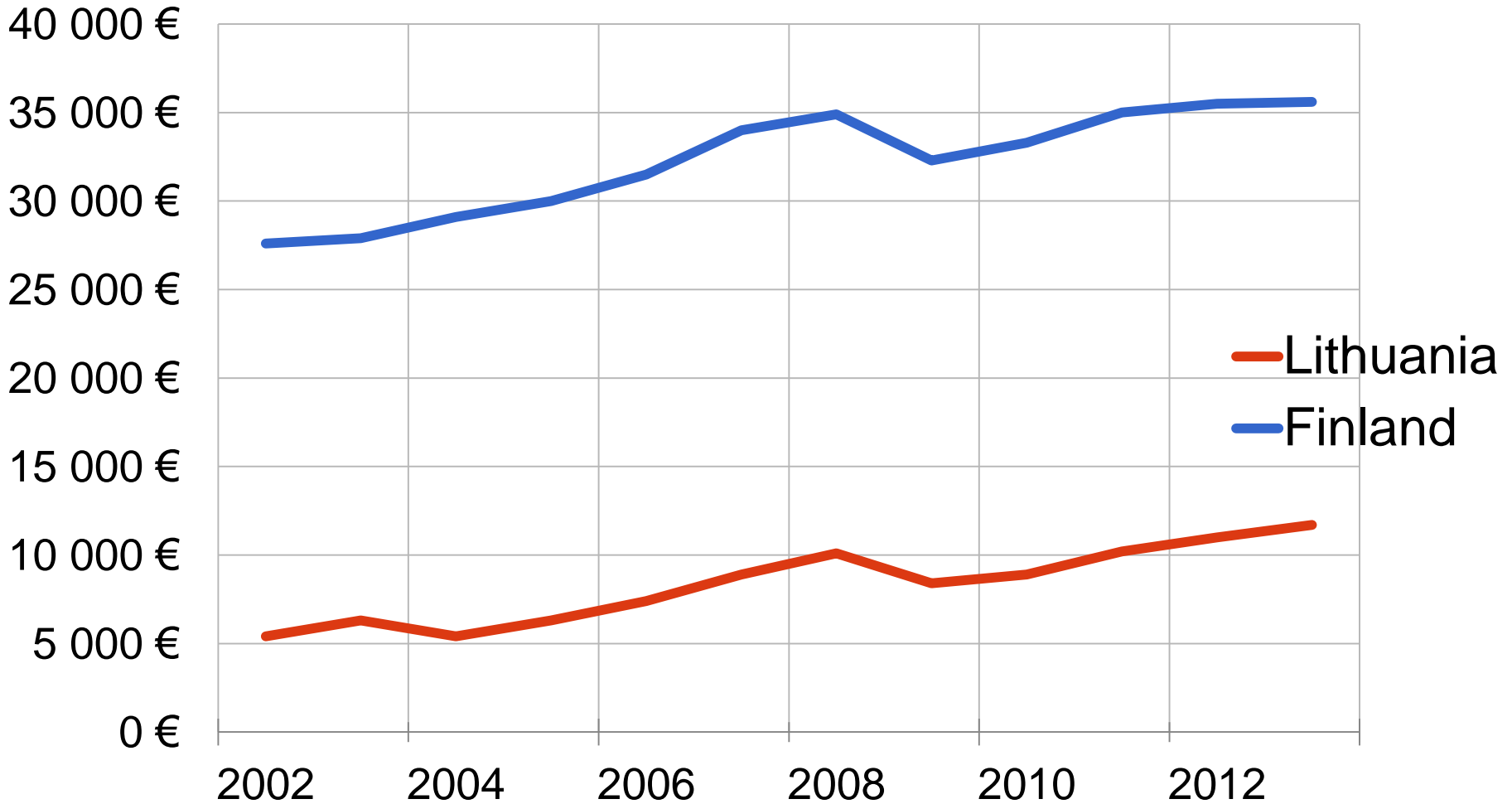

GDP/CAP *Development*

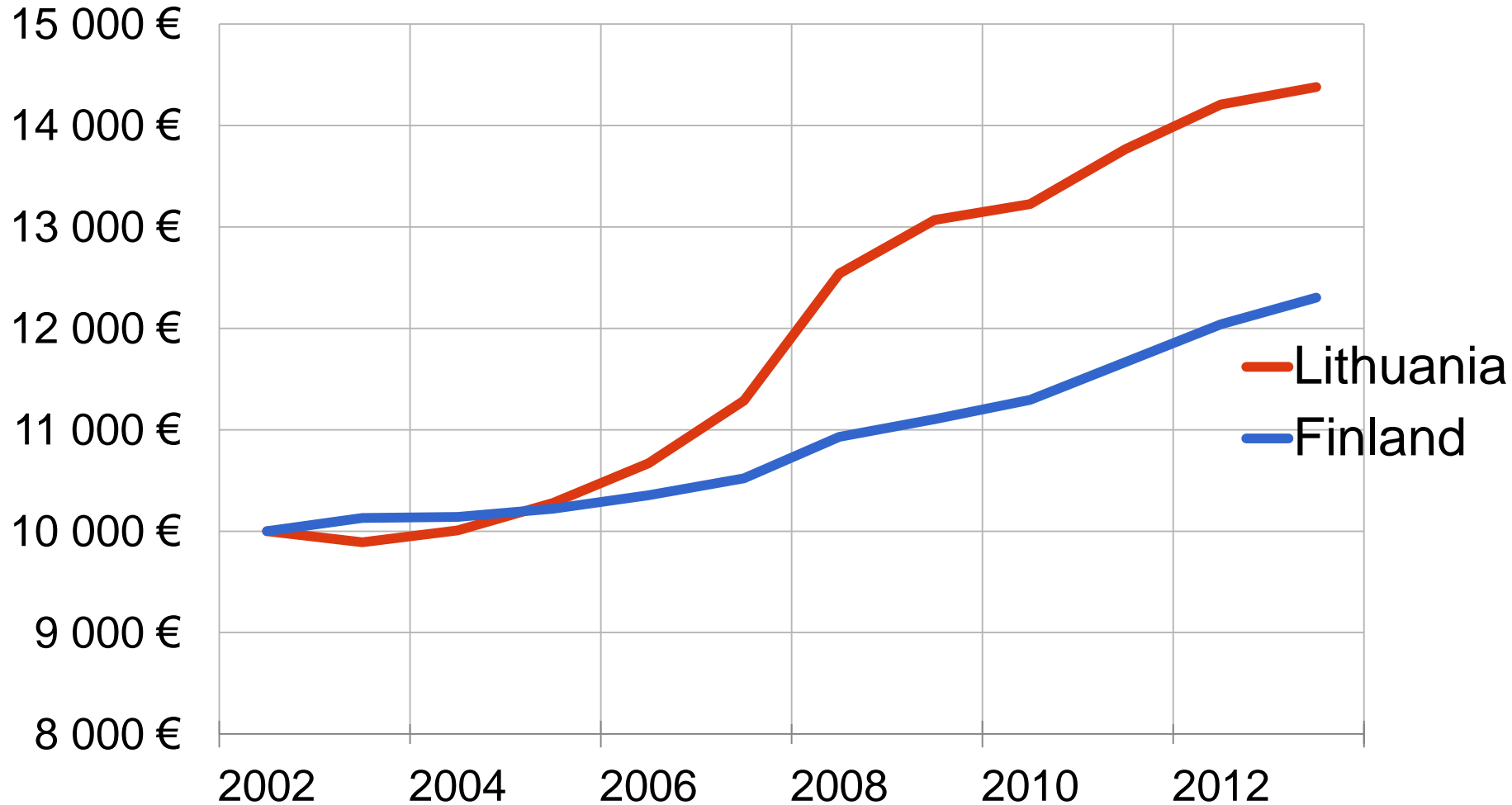

Product price Development

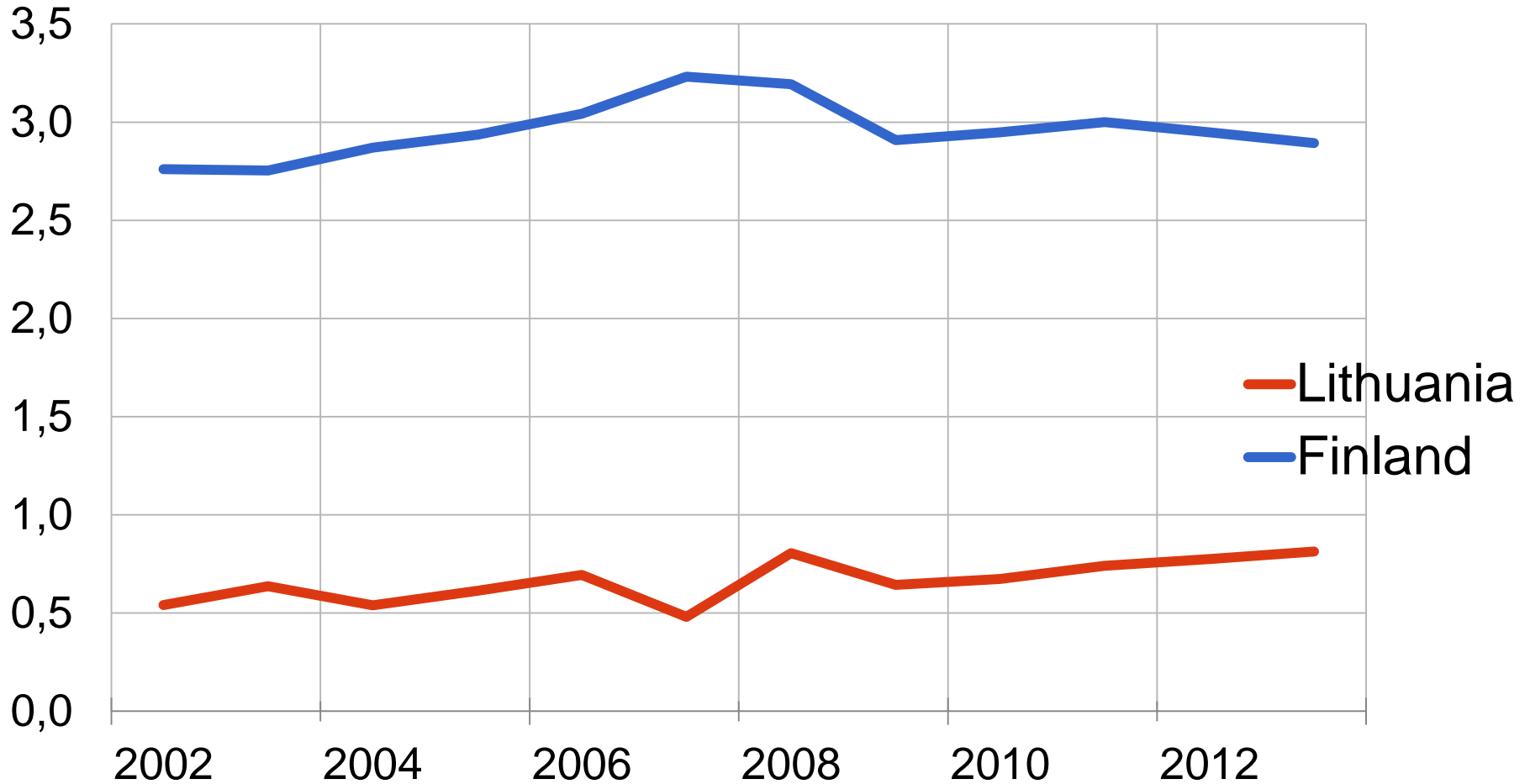
